Psychiatric care center planned for city

Facility to be built in Sunflower Commerce Park

Bel Aire is getting a new business at its Sunflower Commerce Park: the Mindcure Behavior & Wellness Center, an inpatient psychiatric care facility.

Officials from the company were at the Bel Aire

City Council meeting Jan. 19 to brief the council on their plan and seek approval of a \$2 million industrial revenue bond for the center, which the council gave.

There is a need for more psychiatric bed space in the area, said the business' chief executive and chief

financial officer, Srinivas Krishnamurthy.

"Other than Good Shepherd (in Wichita), there is nothing else for 150 miles," he said.

As planned, the first phase of the project will have 14 two-bed rooms and a staff of eight to 10.

Patients would all be 18 or older and stay an average of three to five days in the 10,500-square-foot center.

Sunflower Commerce Park was chosen because of its "great location" on a main road with easy access to a high population base, Krishnamurthy said. The

site is on the east side of Webb between K-96 and K-254 highways.

Mindcure Behavior & Wellness Center had been in discussions previously with city officials and the topic was originally

City animal control remains in limbo

Bel Aire resident Randell Harms is frustrated over the city's at-large animal policy — or lack of it.

At issue is a dog that, for the past six months, has made his presence known around Harms and his much smaller dog, Cassie, a 10-year-old Jack Russell and Rat Terrier mix, who is either in the house or on a leash.

Harms is hesitant to call the dog a stray as he's well fed, but he's certainly been a nuisance, attracted by Cassie.

"It has urinated and defecated on my bushes to mark its territory, which has destroyed them," Harms said. "It follows us for miles as we walk our dog and he gets all the other dogs in the

area barking."

Harms said he tried to be a "considerate neighbor" and he understands dogs getting loose from time to time, but his patience is wearing thin.

He's contacted authorities, but is not happy that the issue wasn't solved.

First, Harms call the Wichita Animal Shelter, which said it couldn't help him because he doesn't live in Wichita.

Then it was on to Sedgwick County Animal Control, which informed him that due to no contract between it and Bel Aire, its staff cannot go there.

The next call was to the Bel Aire police, which Harms said told him that a resident must catch a dog first.

"The police department has no way to tranquilize the dog?" he asked.

Police Chief Darrell Atteberry said it's true that they don't have specialized animal control equipment, which is expensive. However, he did say they try and help residents if called, and will try to "cajole" a pet into their vehicle and take it to the shelter.

"Most of them are nice dogs," Atteberry said.

However, police aren't going to try the same approach with a vicious dog.

"We don't like getting bit anymore than any one else," he said.

They would try and borrow some equipment to handle such an animal, but then they are stuck because they don't have animal cages. It has not

City employee pay issue settled

Council turns down COLA

The Bel Aire City Council in January wrestled with city staff pay.

At its Jan. 5 meeting, the council declined to fund any cost-of-living adjustment increases for the city's 38 employees.

The situation had been the source of much discussion at a workshop in December, with some members wanting an automatic 2 percent COLA and others wanting increases based on merit.

At its Jan. 19 meeting, the council approved a new salary scale that did not include the COLA, nor any other automatic raise. However, employees may receive a merit raise from their supervisor.

Employees received a 1 percent COLA in 2015.

"I'm happy with the staff, but since the seniors (citizens) didn't get a COLA this year, I'm against this," said member Guy MacDonald.

Replied member Peggy O'Donnell: "I would hate to use Social Security as our measuring stick."

She added that the money for a COLA is in the budget. However, she didn't find other members who agreed with her.

Member Diane Wynn said in her work experience, COLA wasn't a part of a normal pay increase.

It varies from city to city as to whether to grant employees a COLA raise, said City Manager Ty Lasher.

"We looked around and the average was 1.8 percent," he said.

Some cities are like Bel Aire and don't give one. However, he said all of the salaries offered by Bel Aire are on par with the job market.

"We try and keep them competitive," he said.

Since there was confusion as to whether employee pay without COLA would be the same in 2016 as 2015, the council voted to table the remainder of the pay schedule to the next meeting.

Pay raises of up to 2 percent have been scheduled in the 2016 budget.

"There were a couple of changes up and down on the grades, so we will ensure that if positions didn't move, they are still going to get the same pay this year," City Manager Ty Lasher said.

All of Bel Aire's employees, including police officers, are nonunion.

Kechi woman dies in crash on K-254

Second fatal wreck in six months

An accident at the intersection of K-254 and Webb Road resulted in the death of a Kechi woman.

Brenda T. Petrey, 63, of Kechi, who was driving a 1997 GMC pickup, was

killed at 8:12 a.m. Jan. 27 as she attempted to go north across the highway and was hit by an east-bound vehicle.

The driver of the other vehicle, Joshua J. Mathews, 35, of White-water, was not injured. Mathews was driving a 2014 Ram pickup. Both drivers were wearing seat belts.

The scene was just outside the Bel Aire city

limits and as such the accident was handled by the Kansas Highway Patrol and the Sedgwick County Sheriff's Office. Bel Aire police, including Chief Darrell Atteberry, did respond and provided traffic control.

"It was a horrific crash," Atteberry said.

Due to the impact directly on the driver's side door, Petrey "didn't stand a chance," he said, even

with a seat belt on and air bags in place.

Petrey's vehicle failed to yield to oncoming traffic, according to an online KHP report.

As officers were working the crash, another accident occurred nearby, also on K-254. A van slowing down for the first accident was hit from behind and then that car was hit by another vehicle. Two of the three drivers in that ac-

cident were uninjured, but the other, the van driver, was taken by ambulance with upper body injuries.

All three had their seat belts on. KHP officers said speed was a factor in the accident and requested that motorists slow down and use extra caution when approaching an accident.

Last summer, two women from southeast Kansas were killed in a crash similar to Petrey's

accident. That crash on July 17 was at K-254 and Greenwich. Authorities say the driver misjudged the speed of an oncoming truck and pulled into the highway.

It can be difficult to judge traffic speed on K-254, police say, as vehicles travel up to 70 mph, so they urge allowing adequate time when entering the highway or crossing the open intersections.

Bringing in commercial businesses like attractions, unique opportunities, dining options, and/or retail will take the tax burden of our land debt payments solely off of our homeowners. It will birth additional growth in respects to industrial and residential and can add to the attractiveness of living in our great city.

My beautiful wife likes to remind me from time to time, with a chuckle, how I during one of the candidates forum said something to the effect of "Buckle your seatbelts folks, the future is going to be exciting." That, while somewhat of a goofy campaign promise then, is happening now.

It is my hope that in concert with citizen input, your governing body and I will be aggressive in thinking outside of the box to begin the long and tedious task of bringing in commercial businesses that will benefit our city.

In addition to seeking citizen input, we have partnered with PEC to develop a master plan. This came highly recommended by well-respected realtor Marlin Penner. As he shared with the council, our engagement with the council, our engagement with the master plan shows we value thoughtfulness. It also shows prospective buyers we are protective of our city and desire fine development.

The tide is turning and it is time we embrace the next phase of our city.



Sunrise students finalists in WSU scholarship program

Two Sunrise Christian Academy students were among the top 12 finalists in the Wichita State University's annual Distinguished Scholarship Invitational (DSI).

Cynthia Matson and Sarah Myose were selected

to compete for one of the two coveted \$60,000 Harry Gore Memorial Scholarships, which are among the largest undergraduate awards in Kansas.

A total of 380 students competed in DSI on Nov. 21.

To be invited to compete in the invitational, students

had to have a 24 or higher ACT score and a minimum 3.50 cumulative GPA. The 12 finalists this year have an average ACT score of 30 and average GPA of 3.82.

Once invited, students complete a packet of information, including essays, and compete in an on-cam-

pus leadership competition. Finalists sent back on campus Jan. 27 for final interviews.

The announcement of the Gore Scholars was Jan. 28.

Neither Matson nor Myose won the Gore award, but will receive competitive scholarship packages to attend WSU in the fall.

scheduled to be brought up earlier, but Krishnamurthy's schedule prevented him from seeking formal council approval until now. Also attending the meeting was the company's medical director and psychologist, Achutha Reddy.

Council members were receptive to the new business.

"I'm glad to see this," said Ramona Becker. "There's such a need for it."

Added Mayor David Austin: "This is something society needs."

Krishnamurthy is projecting taking losses the first two years of business before turning a profit in the third year. The initial building should be completed by the end of this year, said Krishnamurthy, who also has plans for additional phases in future years.

Austin stressed that the city has no financial obligation in issuing the bond and the city will realize \$2 in return for every \$1 spent through the bond.

The closest in-patient state mental care center is three hours from Wichita in Osawatomie. Public health officials say it has been overcrowded.

Krishnamurthy said he and his staff are looking forward to developing their business model in Bel Aire and expanding it to meet the growing need.

"We're really excited about it," he said. In other action, the council: •Established March 19 as the Spring Festival date and Oct. 15 as the Fall Festival date. Also, it set the citywide garage sales period as June 23 through 25 and waived garage sale permit fees during that time.

•Approved appropriations of \$261,352.

•Approved having AGH & Ad-

visors complete the 2015 city of Bel Aire financial audit.

•Accepted a services proposal from Professional Engineering Consultants of Wichita for work on a development plan for the city and to examine future land use. The contract cost is not to be more than \$24,000.

•Approved a proposal for website redesign and hosting from CivicPlus at cost of \$3,975 per year. City official say Bel Aire's website, which was built in 2008, is dated and a new site could include features that would allow residents to access services without having to come to City Hall.

Before the council meeting, a meeting was held of the Bel Aire Land Bank, which includes all the council members and the mayor. It tabled an option agreement for a real estate purchase between the Land Bank and PDS Development Co. It also approved a real estate purchase agreement with Sam Moosavi for land at the northwest corner of Rock and 45th Street North. Moosavi plans to build a small retail center there. The land is zoned for that application.

All five members and the mayor were present. The next meeting will be 7 p.m. Feb. 2 at City Hall.

In other action Jan. 5, the council:

•Authorized an agreement with the Greater Wichita YMCA for it to use the Bel Aire recreation building for its summer day camp for school-aged children. Under terms of the agreement, the city will receive a minimum of \$4,800 and up to \$6,960 if all slots are filled. According to a report received from Brian Hayes, recreation director, there was uncertainty if the camp would be back in 2016 as attendance was down 8 percent in 2015 compared to 2014. Furthermore, Bel Aire has the smallest day camp site operated by the Y. However, the program has proven popular with the city's residents who do use it and the Y asked that the camp, which has been offered in the city since 1996, return. Last year, 35 children a week attended. There is room for 45.

•Approved a resolution calling for higher city fees for non-

residents, including a 10 percent increase in recreation center program fees to cover items such as T-shirts, medals and other cost. Lasher said those fees have not increased since 2011. Other fees now more accurately reflect the actual cost of service or are equal to what other cities charge.

•Approved an appropriation ordinance of \$601,567. The higher-than-normal amount included pay down on the city's debt from land sale proceeds.

•Approved a bid from Kansas Paving of \$204,669 for paving and drainage improvements at the Courtyards at Elk Creek Phase 2. The bid was \$37,000 less than the higher offer. Kansas Paving did the work in Phase 1 of the project. "It's exciting to see this development," Mayor David Austin said.

•Approved setting the State of the City address and a strategic planning session for 6:30 p.m. Jan. 12 at City Hall. The two events are open to the public.

•Tabled three agenda items. They are: the Bel Aire Council Meeting Rules of Order based on Bob's Rules of Order, which

is used in Newton, and is called a simplified guideline; a revised council workshop policy, which states that, if needed, workshops will be held at 6:30 p.m. on the second Tuesday of the month; and a revised council meeting policy. The items were tabled because members thought, as written, they weren't clear enough or had errors in them. Council members said they would point those errors out to staff and have them rewritten.

•Adopted the 2016 League of Municipalities Statement of Municipal Policy as the city's legislative platform for the year.

•Received a notice from Lasher that the number of units at Broadstone Villas 2 has changed from 48 income-tested units to 52 and market-based units went from 12 down to six due to federal guidelines. The change will be included in the city's resolution of support for the new project.

All five members and the mayor were present. There was no executive session. The next meeting is 7 p.m. Jan. 19 at City Hall.

been an issue recently, but a long-term answer needs to be found, he said.

"In the past, we were always able to call the county," he said.

Harms also wondered what Bel Aire will do if feral animals, such as fox or a rabid skunk, create a problem in the city.

Although the stray dog is no longer bothering Harms and his family — at least in their yard — he is still loose, running in the neighborhood.

While he wasn't aware of Harms' case, City Manager Ty Lasher said he realizes that the city doesn't currently have animal control, but he is working to resolve that.

"The struggle we're having now is that we had a contract with Sedgwick County to do our animal control and they ended the agreement, saying they wanted to update the contracts," he said.

"So, all of a sudden we didn't have a contact anymore."

The city tried to get an agreement with Wichita, but that falls under the police department, and while the yearlong search was on for a new chief, that decision got pushed aside, Lasher said.

Harms' situation is unusual, Lasher said.

"We really don't have that much of a problem with loose animals here," he said.

Lasher said the county's animal control previously was called one or two times month and charged the city a nominal \$30 fee.

"It was something like \$400 a year for us," he said.

It's not worth it for the city then to have its own animal control, he said, given the cost of proper equipment and staffing time.

Currently, Bel Aire police officers will handle a stray animal complaint the best they can, he said.

If they can catch one

and there's a tag with the owner's information, they will contact that person.

If the police can catch the animal, they will take it to the Wichita Animal Shelter at 3300 N. Hillside.

Lasher said getting the situation resolved is in the plans for this year.

"We do want to get something in writing," he said.

Harms is eager to see that taken care of. He lives in the southwest corner of Bel Aire, among the oldest part of town, and its large lots mean it's difficult and expensive to fence in the property.

"This is a quiet neighborhood and a really nice place to live," he said. "I just want to keep it that way."

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Bel Aire teacher on leave after arrest

Steven Thompson, 62, a teacher in Bel Aire, continues to be on paid administrative leave as Wichita school district

officials look into charges that he possessed child pornography, said USD 259 spokeswoman Susan Arensman.

Thompson, who taught math at Northeast Magnet

High School, 5500 N. Lycee, was arrested Jan. 8 and charged with three counts of sexual exploitation of a child. Authorities say an investigation revealed the images on

his computer at his former workplace, Garden City Community College, along with other computers and devices.

On Jan. 14, Thompson made his initial appear-

ance in Finney County District Court, where he informed the judge that he had hired an attorney to represent him. He is set for another court date March 14.

His formal charges are three counts of sexual exploitation of a child.

School officials say that a background check revealed no previous convictions against Thompson.


